The Curriculum

A full range of teaching and learning experiences was provided for all classes in line with the Northern Ireland Curriculum and at levels appropriate to individual children.

Co-ordinators continued to monitor, review and plan for each subject. The development of teaching and learning focused upon Literacy, Numeracy, ICT and PATHS.

Teaching staff attended courses relevant to their Teaching Allowances and areas of interest and expertise. Classroom Assistants were given the opportunity to attend Curriculum Development Sessions and School Development Days (as appropriate) along with the teaching staff. Further opportunities were also provided for staff to attend First Aid, PATHS and Sounds Write courses.

End of Key Stage Assessment:

From September 2012 the Department of Education put new arrangements in place for the statutory assessment of Communication and Using Mathematics in key Stages 1 and 2. Pupils in Year 4 and Year 7 are involved in Statutory assessment as organised by CEA (Curriculum Council for Examinations and Assessment). In Year 4 it is expected that children, of average ability or above, will attain Level 2 or above in Communication and using Mathematics and in Year 7, children of average ability or above, will attain level 4 or above in Communication and Using Mathematics. [Due to a strike action by the main teaching unions, no data was sent this year to the Department regarding levels.

Music:

The past year saw the school continuing to benefit from our in-house expertise and also from the EAWR's Music service (peripatetic instrumental tuition). All Year 5 pupils accessed a thirty week stringed instrumental tuition programme where they learned to play the violin or cello. This was a great experience for Year 5 pupils and all pupils successfully mastered an instrument.

In addition to this approximately 42 pupils availed of tutoring in Brass, Woodwind, Violin and Cello. During the year the Senior Choir sang for the parents at the Harvest Festival, Christmas Concert, Carol Service and the end of year Musical Extravaganza for parents. Residents of local residential homes were entertained by both the Junior and Senior Choirs when they went carol singing in December!

Our choirs entered Omagh Feis choir and choral competition and had great success in both, with the Senior Choir winning the Unison category.

PDMU/Health Promotion:

Our focus in PDMU was extending the Barnardos PATHS Programme across all curricular areas and ensuring all members of the school community were endorsing and putting into practice PATHS principles. We were delighted to have achieved PATHS MODEL SCHOOL STATUS, in recognition of the high quality lesson delivery and permeation of programme in all areas of school life

The school also continued to promote and instill the benefits of a healthy lifestyle across all key stages.

Throughout the year staff planned and delivered interactive and enjoyable assemblies and lessons promoting healthy living.

As part of our Health Promoting ethos, pupils continued to participate voluntarily in the Healthy Breaks Scheme and were encouraged to think about break time snacks. Omagh County P.S encouraged the Munchbox Challenge to encourage healthy packed lunches within school. School meals are also planned to meet the nutritional standards guidelines. Parents all received a School Meals Menu for the year.

Health related assemblies were delivered throughout the year. These included Healthy Living and Exercise, Sun Safety, Road Safety, Firework Safety and Anti-Bullying. Values were also focused on through class assemblies and Good Citizen Awards. These covered the themes of good manners, honesty, helpfulness, personal organisation and personal presentation.

All classes continued to participate in a variety of health related programmes. Year 1 to Year 4 enjoyed the Physical Literacy Programme run in conjunction with the IFA. Year 6 participated in the Smokebusters' programme and enjoyed Physical Education lessons with students from Omagh High School. Year 7 completed the British Heart Association 'Heartstart' programme.

The school was rewarded the Action Cancer Gold Health Award for the tenth year running.

School Council:

Throughout the year, pupil representatives from Years 3 to 7 regularly attended monthly meetings led by Miss Funston. The School Council is the voice to all the pupils and liaise between the Principal and pupils to raise issues which are relevant to them.

The School Council ably organized a Valentine's Day Secret Compliments and a family Pancake Breakfast.

Eco-Club:

Throughout the year, pupil representatives from Years 4-7 have regularly attended meetings to plan and promote activities to make OCPS more environmentally friendly.

They planted and harvested various vegetables in the school garden. They focused on increasing the number of children who walk to school through Walk to School Week events. The members of the Eco-Club were also involved in promoting ways that Omagh County P.S. could reduce their energy usage, especially the use of electricity.

The school currently holds the Eco Schools Green Flag Award and a SUSTRANS Silver Award

Young Enterprise

This programme is a collaboration between the school, Young Enterprise and local businesses. The programme is delivered to all year groups and focuses on the themes of Ourselves, Our Families, Our Community, Our City, Our World, Our Nation and Business Beginnings.

Community Relations, Equality and Diversity:

The Governors fully recognise and support the efforts made by the staff to maintain a caring, nurturing and sensitive environment within the school. Along with the staff, they acknowledge the diversity that exists within the enrolment and are fully committed to an ethos of inclusion by developing positive relationships within the school at all levels.

The Governors support the efforts of the staff to provide opportunities to extend this policy outside the school, through initiatives, sports, quizzes, links with the Community and other schools, visitors and visits.

Shared Education:

Omagh County PS and Holy Family P.S. received Shared Education funding from the DENI, for a three year period. The focus of this project is Numeracy and STEM throughout Key Stage 2. Staff participated in joint continued professional development and Year 1-7 staff planned and delivered a number of joint activities.

The purchase of Busy Things (Yr 1-4) and Mathletics (Yr3-6) for the school was procured through this funding. This year also saw the formation of a joint Shared Education choir. Both schools are grateful to FODC funding to acquire t-shirts with the joint logo.

Art:

Year 6 and 7 pupils benefited from the input of our resident artist, Mr Trevor Verner, who worked with the classes developing their drawing skills.

The children benefited, as did our staff, from Mr Verner's high level of expertise, skill and commitment to the project. The results in such a short period of time were remarked upon by parents, staff and visitors to the school alike.

The children enjoyed their art classes and as well as developing their drawing skills the programme enhances and promotes self-esteem, concentration, an eye for detail and patience.

Sport:

We have a strong sporting tradition both as part of the curriculum and as after- schools coaching sessions. The school has also maintained and extended its links with local community clubs.

As part of PE lessons during the school day we secured during the 2015-16 school year:

- Surestart: Nursery availed of ball skills coaching and yoga activities, as part of the Surestart programme, both of which helped develop children's co-ordination and concentration.
- IFA Football Coaching in Year 1-4: For the fifth year pupils have benefited from weekly coaching sessions, from the IFA coach, Mr John Molloy. This has been most worthwhile; teachers have commented that Mr Molloy is an excellent coach and pupils' skills have developed through his coaching programme.
- Hockey Coaching: Year 6 and 7 received weekly coaching sessions. This allowed us to develop pupil skills and Boys and Girls Hockey Teams to enter local tournaments.
- Golf: Year 7 pupils enjoyed a 6 week golf programme facilitated by Omagh Golf Club
- Rugby: Year 5-7 enjoyed rugby coaching. This was organised through the IRFU
- Dance: Year 6 and 7 participated in dance workshops. Yr 5 Ceili dancing organised through Omagh District Council and Year 7 at Omagh Leisure Centre
- Swimming: All Year 6 and 7 availed of a 15 week Schools Swimming Programme in Omagh Leisure Centre
- Omagh High School: A strong link has developed over recent years with Omagh High School Sports Studies students taking P.E. classes alongside their teacher Mrs Susan Pauley. A large number of our classes benefit from this link, which covers all areas of the PE. Curriculum

Mrs McGirr continues to run our After-Schools Club for Year 1 and 2, which remains as popular as ever, as does our Homework Club for Year 3-7 pupils run by Mrs Stewart-King.

As governors we wish to extend our many thanks to all staff, coaches and parents who have given of their time to ensure our pupils gain from a broad range of experiences during their primary education.

Pastoral Care and Child Protection:

At the beginning of the year, the school issues a pastoral care booklet to new families, which comprehensively covers those areas which focus on our children's wellbeing.

The Pastoral Care Pack is available through the school web-site for all other families.

The school continues to participate in initiatives such as Healthy Breaks, Munch Box Challenge, Breakfast Club, Anti-Bullying Week and International Day of Languages.

Children are encouraged to strive for the Good Citizen Award which addresses a range of different personal, social and emotional targets on a weekly basis. The award is presented weekly in assembly.

After School Care (Year 1-3), and a Homework Club (Year 3-7) are available daily, ensuring children are cared for until they are collected by parents.

Staff and Governors continued to implement the Pastoral Care and Child Protection Policies in relation to the Department of Education's 2006 and 2008 Circulars. New employees and volunteers were cleared through Access NI. This is a rigorous process and we would take this opportunity to thank our many volunteers for their valuable input into school life. Parents were also given the school's summary document relating to Child Protection procedures in their September pack.

The Designated Teacher for Child Protection is Mrs A. Dempsey and the Deputy is Miss J. Funston. Mr M Winter is the Designated Governor for Child Protection. Mrs J. MacCrossan is the Designated Teacher for Child Protection in Nursery. Child Protection Procedures are disseminated to teaching, non-teaching, placement students and PTA and Parent Volunteers during the autumn term each year. Child Protection is itemised on the agenda at each Board of Governors' Meeting. Relevant staff attended Case Conferences and LAC (Looked After Children) reviews and provided reports and information as required to Social Services.

While policies and practices are in place to ensure that all are presented with a safe and secure environment, the school continues to expand and improve upon existing procedures.

Positive Behaviour:

Staff continue to implement our Positive Behaviour Policy. Classroom rules were negotiated at the beginning of the year and staff continued to implement the hierarchy of rewards and sanctions associated with Golden Time.

Reinforcing the Golden Rules and rewarding examples of exemplar behaviour aids to the success of good behaviour throughout the school.

It is worthwhile to note that the good behaviour of our pupils is often commented upon, particularly when we take children outside of school.

Year 6 Castlewellan Trip:

Provision of Information to Parents

The school has provided the opportunities for parents to take active interest in the education of their children this year and has found parents very responsive indeed.

Liaison included:

- > Nursery Parents were invited to an Information Meeting in June 2016 and to an Open Day along with their child. The children had an opportunity to meet Mrs MacCrossan, the Nursery teacher. Direct communication with parents takes place at various stages during the school year i.e. settling in meeting, mid-year interview and transition to Primary. Strong links are promoted with the Primary School including School Book Fair, use of Primary School facilities and visits by Primary 1 teachers to the Nursery setting.
- > P1 parents were invited in the Term before their children started school to meet the Class Teacher, receive their 'Starting School' Booklets and discuss important aspects of school routine with the Principal
- Each teacher P1-7 held an information meeting at the start of September to give parents an overview of the year ahead.
- > In March, all parents received formal invitations to visit the school to discuss their children's progress with the teachers. P7 parents were also invited to discuss the transfer from primary to secondary school at the start of February. Parents could contact the Principal and arrange to see her, or a class teacher, if they had a particular problem. There were also many opportunities to visit events held in the school e.g. Harvest Service, Christmas Concerts, Daffodil Tea and Sport's Day. The PTA had a very successful year and the Governors would like to thank them for all their hard work.
- > P7 had opportunities to smooth their passage into secondary school by visiting the secondary schools, or by talking to secondary school teachers when they visited us in June.
- > SEN interviews for those parents whose children are on the school's SEN Register.

- > All curriculum and non-curriculum policies are made available to parents and are held on file for reference at any time.
